There are a lot of teenagers who feel lonely and desperate. They cannot trust their parents and even though they have friends, they do not know much about life or the difference between what is good or bad. I am truly grateful to be in the Girls Only Club. Being in that group has helped me recognize my values and learn how to be a better daughter, friend, sister, and a better person. Being a Girls Only member helped me realize that I am not alone, and that there is a group of friends that will be there for me whenever I need them. Girls Only has also taught me to be wise and how to give myself the value that I deserve and see myself as beautiful and precious as God sees me.

There has been a lot of activities we

have done that has impacted me tremendously. For example, last year we had a teen girl retreat with the theme of *Lost and Found* that impacted me in a really amazing way. GIRLS MINISTRIES (GM) WEEK IS THE SECOND WEEK OF SEPTEMBER AND IS THE OFFICIAL KICKOFF OF THE ANNUAL THEME FOR THE 2014–2015 SCHOOL YEAR. THIS IS A DESIGNATED OPPORTUNITY TO INCREASE AWARENESS, VISIBILITY, UNDERSTANDING, AND ENTHUSIASM FOR GM IN YOUR CHURCH AND COMMUNITY. THIS MAY BE A GOOD WEEK TO HAVE A MOTHER-DAUGHTER BANQUET, A GIRL’S NIGHT OUT, OR OUTREACH. HERE ARE SOME IDEAS TO HELP YOU GET STARTED:

2 MONTHS BEFORE NGM WEEK

- Check with your pastor about placing a National Girls Ministries Week service on the calendar, the possibility of presenting Girls Ministries during a service, and/or a directed Girls Ministries prayer time.
- Another option if you are unable to have a service is to see if you can set up a booth outside the sanctuary promoting Girls Ministries and discipleship to girls.



1 MONTH BEFORE NGM WEEK

- With your pastor’s approval, arrange for a speaker for your NGMW service.
- Provide the devotional and Flourish theme verse (Psalm 1:1–3) to the speaker as a suggested sermon topic or the *Girls Ministries promotional video*.



2 WEEKS BEFORE NGM WEEK

- Pray with your girls and sponsors concerning the NGMW service and offering.
- Display the *NGMW Poster* included on this DVD in the Posters folder.
- Girls can decorate offering containers to be used to receive the NGMW offering.
- Select girls to be greeters and ushers.
- Print the order of service and/or other pertinent NGMW information in your church bulletin. Basic NGMW information is on page 8.



BEFORE THE SERVICE

- Girls can serve as greeters, distributing a printed program listing all participants in the service along with their club level and perhaps a short bio. A Girls Clubs bulletin (item 08MY8275) is available from *Gospel Publishing House.



ENTERING THE CHURCH

- The children can enter to various club or Girls Ministries (“Honor You”) theme songs, each club carrying a club banner. (Club banner posters are available from *Gospel Publishing House.)



time thinking through the environment (color, light, sounds, seating) and social arrangement (seating and time set aside for questions and conversation). Any attention to detail will not go unnoticed.

Model the way. Research shows girls learn more quickly and deeply when they are taught by a role model. Girls need a real-life example. They benefit from seeing a flourishing faith being lived out by someone they respect; they're more apt to repeat that behavior. Girls can learn the art of hospitality by watching their Girls Ministries leader decorate their classroom and how they keep it organized. They can watch how the leader makes each girl feel welcomed and noticed as she walks in the room. Girls take cues from how the leader presents herself in dress, body language, and conversation. If she feels she can look up to her, she'll want to be like her.

Go deep in discipleship. Girls become risk-takers in single-gender environments — and that's a good thing. Learning theory shows us that learners are risk-takers; they ask questions, make guesses, and process their thoughts out loud. Asking questions and digging into what-ifs are an important part of spiritual de-

velopment. Single-gender rooms led by skilled teachers promote an environment where girls can have these conversations and safely ask questions that will lead to a deeper, flourishing faith.

In the study "The Role of Mentoring," which examined the effect of single-gender mentoring programs, researchers found that girls in these programs reported significantly better grades, greater academic self-esteem, more positive feelings about school, better teacher relationships, and a greater likelihood of attending and completing college. Their needs were better met in the context of gender specific programs. Titus 2 validates this truth in our environments that build faith.

Fueling a Flourishing Faith. One of the main predictors of a student maintaining the faith after high school is having quality adult relationships within their home and church, according to the Fuller Youth Institute (FYI). Providing single-gender environments where these relationships can flourish and provide friendship, support, and discipleship could be the single-most important act leaders can do for the youth in our churches.

Separating boys and girls in a spiritual growth environment can foster a deep foundation for a life-long, flourishing faith. ♦

Girls are wildly and wonderfully different from boys. Thankfully that's no longer politically incorrect to acknowledge. In fact, catering to these differences can make a tremendous difference when discipling girls and seeing them flourish in the faith.

Girls and boys do not differ in their ability to love God, respond to His Spirit, or grow in relationship with Him. But how we as Christian leaders foster those end goals should look different.

Since we have so little time in which to compete for the attention of the hearts and souls of these girls on a weekly basis, we must maximize our time. One powerful way to do that is in single gender environments. It's a simple shift that brings profound benefits.

Here are four ways to help your girls flourish:

Dive into the details. Did you know girls can hear better than boys? Females can hear tones ten times softer than their male counterparts, according to research cited in *Why Gender Matters*, by Dr. Leonard Sax. That's just the beginning. Because male and female brains process differently, leaders would do well to differentiate instruction. The same content can be taught, but a girls' leader should spend more

Flourish is defined as to grow or develop in a healthy or vigorous way, especially as the result of a particularly favorable environment. Other synonyms include: thrive, prosper, increase, multiply, blossom, and bear fruit. When we think about the girls we minister to each week, these are all the characteristics we pray they will obtain as they grow in their walk with the Lord. So as you are preparing for the 2014–2015 year of Girls Clubs, how will you help your girls flourish?

Keep this theme at the forefront throughout the school year by using it in different ways. Wouldn't it be great at your Celebration in 2015 to talk about all the ways your girls have flourished throughout the year? Here are some ideas on how to use the Flourish theme:

SET A GOAL: Each week give girls a benchmark for how they will focus. The following week take a few minutes to talk about how they flourished in that benchmark. Repeat each month. Give the Flourish theme reproducible cards to your girls as a reminder of what they should be focusing on.

Week 1: Reading your Bible

Week 2: Praying

Week 3: Worship/Praising God

Week 4: Encouraging and loving others

Week 5: Friendships and family

EVENTS: The Flourish theme isn't just for National Girls Ministries Week events; it can be used all year. Host a Girls Ministries retreat, worship and devotion night, or outreach event using Flourish as your theme.

COINS FOR KIDS (CFK): Use the CFK project to help your girls flourish in giving to others. Remind them how they can make an eternal difference by sharing the love of Jesus with orphans and caregivers when they give to CFK and the China Orphan Care project.

NATIONWIDE SLEEPOVER: Help your girls grow and flourish in personal evangelism by inviting friends to your Exploration China Sleepover. Use the Outreach Preparation (found on page 12 of the *Sleepover Planning Guide*) for steps to help girls get started.

CELEBRATIONS: Use the Flourish theme during your annual Celebrations service. Take time to talk about how each girl flourished in her relationship with God this year.

I could feel the young teen's negative attitude in the air. In fact, I could see it and hear it. The slouched posture, folded arms followed by the deep obnoxious sigh of boredom demonstrated her lack of excitement to be a part of the event. She was not engaged mentally or emotionally to any aspect of the special night we had planned at the church. I thought to myself, "Doesn't she appreciate anything we have done for her to have this? The trendy promo handouts? The creative décor? The cool video? The touching music? ANYTHING?"

Honestly, no, she didn't appreciate anything. We had done all I knew to make the event a success, but this girl didn't care. She was in her own world with her own issues. At first, I felt anger over her obvious pride and the selfish mind-set she displayed. Then, I felt disappointed that the event wasn't perfectly reaching every girl. But surprisingly, I felt compassion. Yes, compassion. And this is when everything changed.

Not that the teen changed, but I certainly did. Instead of focusing on my frustrations over her behaviors, I began to think, "What would cause a young girl to be uninterested in a night that was full of fun and inspiration? How can I help her warm up and be open to all God has for her?" Basically, I went from being judgmental to being like Jesus.

In Psalm 116:5, scripture gives insight into the Lord. It says, "The LORD is gracious and righteous; our God is full of compassion." And we see how Jesus righteously demonstrated this gracious compassion with people such as when the woman was caught in adultery in John 8:

"⁷ Let any one of you who is without sin be the first to throw a stone at her."⁸ Again he stooped down and wrote on the ground.⁹ At this, those who heard began to go away one at a time, the older ones first, until only Jesus was left, with the woman still standing there.¹⁰ Jesus straightened up and asked her, "Woman, where are they? Has no one condemned you?"¹¹ "No one, sir," she said. "Then, neither do I condemn you," Jesus declared. "Go now and leave your life of sin."

Just like Jesus addressed issues without condemnation, so should we. As we are leading a generation of girls in their relationship with Christ, we must be compassionate. These girls need the grace and love that the Lord has shown to us. They need forgiveness and understanding despite what they are acting like or deserve.

This leadership approach of compassion is what will speak louder to them than any event we could plan. As I began to pray about the girl with the attitude that was seated close to me, the Lord spoke to me an idea to connect with her. During worship, I quietly moved forward to where she was standing. I gently placed my hand on her back, closed my eyes and began praying for her. Her body language was tense and I knew she was looking at me with annoyance but I kept praying. After a minute or two I leaned over to ask her if there was anything I could pray for specifically in her life. She abruptly answered "No." So, I decided I would pray what I felt the Lord wanted for her. I kept it simple and nonthreatening but spoke truth over her. After the prayer, there wasn't a visible change so I discreetly and with a smile asked her if she would come chat with me. We exited the auditorium and awkwardly sat down at a table in the foyer.

After introducing myself and assuring her she wasn't in trouble, I offered to purchase her a smoothie that she could enjoy while we talked. She looked a bit surprised but perked up. She answered with a slight smile, "Um, sure!" Over the next 25 minutes we talked openly. At first I talked a little about myself, then I asked much about her life. I listened intently and with many questions. Over time, her answers became longer and more in depth.

As I watched her talk, she evolved from being a snobby girl with an attitude to a vulnerable 14-year-old that was obviously insecure and uncertain. She said she was nervous to be there and didn't have friends at church. She talked about her parent's divorce and her older brother who was in deep trouble. She mentioned she wasn't sure about the Lord as she had been making choices she knew weren't right. On and on we talked until we needed to join the message in the service. As we left the table to walk into service together, she thanked me. I gave her a simple hug and told her I was glad to get to know

her and looked forward to the next time we could get together. She agreed by saying, "Yeah, that would be cool."

I don't remember exactly what happened in her heart during the message that night, but I do remember that showing her compassion instead of criticism opened her heart towards the Lord. She came back to Wednesday nights and over time her attitude began to disappear. She would wave as she passed me with her new group of friends making sure that I saw her. We also connected on several more occasions just to chat. Truly, she was beginning to flourish.

You and I have the ability to bring out the God-given possibilities in the girls we lead or to burden them with our perspective of their behavioral issues. When it comes to influencing youth in the way Jesus did, we can remember, "When he saw the crowds, he had compassion on them" (Matthew 9:36). Let's help them to flourish by showing them compassion in these simple ways:

See them as Christ sees them. When we view them with a belief in the potential God has for them, it begins the work of compassion in our heart.

Smile, listen, encourage, give gifts, write notes, and listen some more. We could have a love and concern for a girl but if all she sees is a distant leader who gets on to her behaviors but never connects in her world, she will not respond. However, using tangible ways of demonstrating our heart for her will begin the process of her opening up to us and ultimately the Lord.

Pray for them and with them. Only the Lord can change a heart and allow the blessing of flourishing in Him. The Lord will respond to our prayers, and the girl will grow in her understanding of God as she hears us pray for her.

What a joy it is to be a part of changing lives and seeing girls mature in their relationships with God! And perhaps seeing one turn from a negative attitude into a flourishing life begins with the leader loving her with a compassionate heart. ♦
