WINNIE:	The country is El Salvador. It's the tiniest country in Central America. It's about the size of our state of Massachusetts.
INTERVIEWER:	But what do clowns have to do with El Salvador?
WINNIE:	El Salvador has almost 3 million children living in the country, and these children need to learn about Jesus.
INTERVIEWER:	That's a lot of kids.
WINNIE:	The missionaries have started ministry teams called "Castillo del Rey," which means "King's Castle." They have hundreds of teams that go all over El Salvador telling the children about Jesus.
INTERVIEWER:	I get it. These ministry teams dress like clowns and do skits and funny things to attract the kids, and then they tell them about Jesus.
WINNIE:	That's right. You'll see these teams on street corners doing puppet shows and drama skits all over the cities. Hundreds of thousands of people have prayed to accept Jesus because of these teams.

- **INTERVIEWER:** That's great, Winnie. And when the children hear about Jesus, they'll go home and tell their parents and friends.
- WINNIE: That is why the King's Castle teams are trying to reach kids in every town, park, slum, and school in El Salvador. These teams are also training lots of teenagers to be ministers and prayer warriors.
- **INTERVIEWER:** And the kids in America are helping the kids in El Salvador by giving to BGMC!
- **WINNIE:** That's right. The money given by the kids in America helps the teams in El Salvador to buy puppets, costumes, and lots more. Without BGMC, it would not be so easy to get supplies. BGMC also paid to develop the discipleship program for the King's Castle ministries.
- **INTERVIEWER:** It's not always easy for kids to give their money to BGMC. Some have to give up ice cream or candy, but it's worth it because people are being reached around the world because of their giving.
- **WINNIE:** And God will bless them for giving to missions!
- **INTERVIEWER:** How else has BGMC helped in El Salvador?
- **WINNIE:** BGMC helps to feed the poor and malnourished kids. BGMC has also helped to supply Sunday School materials, Royal Rangers materials, Missionettes materials, and Christian TV and radio programs.
- **INTERVIEWER:** That's great, Winnie. I'm so glad that BGMC is a blessing to our missionaries and provides the supplies they need to reach the lost. Winnie, you sure looked funny coming in here dressed like a clown, but now we know why clowns are so important to El Salvador.
