
Winnie the World Skit

WINNIE: Vanuatu is made up of four main islands and more than 80 smaller ones. People live on about

65 of the islands.

INTERVIEWER: Do we have missionaries in Vanuatu?

WINNIE: Yes we do. We have a number of Assemblies of God churches and several Bible schools.

INTERVIEWER: Do the people listen to the message the missionaries bring?

WINNIE: They do now but they didn't always listen. In fact, when the first missionaries from England

came to Vanuatu in the 1800s, they were killed minutes after their boat landed.

INTERVIEWER: That's so sad, Winnie. Did more missionaries come?

WINNIE: Yes, more missionaries came. Some were killed, but some were able to share the gospel

message. Soon Christianity began to spread throughout the islands. Today the majority of

people in Vanuatu claim to be Christians.

INTERVIEWER: Once again, this shows the importance of what our missionaries do. If missionaries had not

come to Vanuatu, the people never would've heard about Jesus. Has BGMC helped in Vanuatu?

WINNIE: BGMC has been a big help in Vanuatu. BGMC has helped to build schools, build medical clinics,

buy supplies and medicine for the clinic, provide books for the Bible school, provide books for

the pastors, and lots more.

INTERVIEWER: That's great, Winnie. The kids here in America are helping people all over the world when they

give to BGMC.

WINNIE: BGMC is also helping the people of Vanuatu get good, clean drinking water by providing our

missionaries the tools to show people how to dig for their own water wells.
